
NUMBER OF HOMES: 150

This 500-family community is in collaboration with Échale and the Imperative Fund. New Story supported the most vulnerable 150 families, and Imperative Fund financed the cost for the 350 families at a higher income level. This is our first project with a mixed-income community.

The average family size for the 150 families consisting of 506 individuals supported by this program is less than Tabasco's average household size of 3.7.

233 of 506 individuals supported by this program are children.


INCOME LEVELS

MONTHLY MEDIAN INCOME PER FAMILY

This community currently has a median monthly income of \$71, or 1600 MXN. Some families are making as low as \$27 a month, or 600 MXN. The top two sources of income are from selling clothes and selling food with 27% of working individuals employed selling clothes and 26% of individuals employed selling food.



Dirt floors are highly unsanitary and impossible to clean because a dirt floor is just dirt. A 2007 World Bank study found that replacing dirt floors with concrete floors led to reduction in anemia, parasitic infections, and diarrhea while improving cognitive development and quality of life.

THE DAILY AVERAGE ACCESSING DRINKING WATER FOR 14 FAMILIES.

Families are at two ends of a spectrum when it comes to getting clean drinking water. Fourteen families spend on average **88 minutes per day**, while 136 families spend **3.5 minutes per day**. The time spent on getting drinking water has downstream effects in these families' lives.

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ABOUT THE DATA

The analysis in this report is based on survey data collected from families in and around the surrounding area of Tenosique from January - April 2019. The survey was conducted on 150 families representing 506 individuals. Data collection was done digitally and stored onto servers in real-time. All survey data was reviewed for completion and data quality. This report contains community-level metrics along with references to external data sources to provide context and a comprehensive understanding of the Tenosique community prior to a social housing intervention. As with any survey-based methodology, there is a small margin of error to consider when interpreting the results. Regardless, we believe that this report identifies key trends and opportunities for action in various domains as it relates to the population of Tenosique.
